1. Welcome and apologies

Welcomes and introductions were made. Apologies as above.

2. Minute of the last meeting and Matters Arising

The note of the previous meeting was approved with a minor amend to the attendance – Sean Scott should read Steven Scott.

Sarah referred to the discussion about funding under item 5 of the previous meeting. Re-iterating that the Voluntary Sector Forum (VSF) and Neighbourhood Network (NN) are useful channels for communicating and providing support with funding and applications.

lan advised that there had been £1million of children's psychology funding there were no successful applications from SE in the first phase. The second tranche of funding had gone through a procurement process and this will be announced shortly. However, he added there had been some useful discussions in Liberton Gilmerton about bringing people together and collaborating.

There will be investment in adult mental health services and activities delivered by small voluntary orgs and community groups through funding from the Scottish Government. EVOC will commit resource to support any groups from SE who wish to apply for funding.

Priority 1 (see report for further detail)

Engage and support young people and their families to develop the skills they need to thrive and reach their potential, targeting support at those in greatest need.

Jackie Stewart talked through the quarterly report. She advised that there had been a lot of youth work and work with families in the last quarter. She explained that over the summer period many of the community centres and libraries had re-opened. Streetwork had increased in partnership with Dunedin Canmore and SFRS and approximately 40 – 50 contacts per week were being made. Jackie advised that a Syrian Girls Programme had taken place in collaboration with the Resettlement Team. South East Edinburgh Youth Associations (SEEYA) had not managed to meet over the summer period but will resume in the next quarter. Jackie added that partnership activity had been planned in preparation for Bonfire night.

In terms of barriers the Youth Employabilty offer in SE part of plan requires an organisation/partner to lead with a specialist remit input. Additionally, the capacity of some buildings is still reduced from pre-COVID levels and some activities remain online, although this does work well for some people.

A number of case studies within the quarterly report illustrate positive areas of partnership working.

Ros confirmed that there was a lot of employability work going on in the area and agreed it would be worthwhile having a discussion about how this can be brought together and reported back to future meetings.

Priority 2 (see report for further detail)

Engage with and provide support to those who are rough sleeping, begging and street drinking in the city centre and southside, working closely with local partners, organisations and communities.

Mark Hamilton commented that a lot of work had already been done on this priority and that relationships between organisations had improved and led to successful partnership working.

Mark referred to the quarterly report and previous actions including operation Taupe, CCTV in St Marys Street, The Welcome Hub, inter-Agency Services Network, Accommodated Services meeting and the street support app.

He spoke about milestones expected to be completed in the next quarter. Including the relocation of Edinburgh Access Practice and The Access Point to Panmure St Anns. The mapping of services which should now be available and will be chased up by Mark. The Multi Agency Vulnerable Adult Group (MAVAG) which has been established and will meet in October for the first time. And lastly the work around Hunter Square including the working group which Mark invited members of the LCPP to contribute to. He explained that a terms of reference and meeting schedule would be drawn up and that buy-in, suggestions and ideas were required, enforcement isn't the only way. He added that the upcoming mental health funding was of interest as many of the users of Hunter Square suffer complex mental health needs.

In terms of the wider factors Mark advised that it is important to bring a lot of the work happening around the city in this area together and to raise awareness of this priority.

Peter referred to mapping of services and explained that EVOC have their Red Book. Furthermore, he suggested that University of Edinburgh could assist with any further mapping. Sarah added that the mapping of services came from the perception that there were gaps in provision. She said that she'd be interested to see this and bring it to the next LCPP if appropriate. Sarah said that she would attend the Hunter Square working group and would assist where other Council services, such as licensing, were required.

Priority 3 (see report for further detail)

Support people living in Dumbiedykes, including those experiencing hardship, and help co-ordinate a sustainable response that builds community resilience and promotes life chances.

Jade had compiled the quarterly report for priority 3. Jackie talked through the report focussing on the work of the 4 subgroups linked to the actions under priority 3 including, advice about money, employment and health, wellbeing and access to food and physical activities, digital technology and learning online skills and enhance the area physically and socially, including bus links, shops and parks.

There was some discussion about the replacement taxi service for the 35 bus route. Peter explained that this was to do with essential roadworks and that initially information only went to around half of the residents but everyone had now been informed.

Peter advised that he has been co-opted on to the Dumbiedykes transport group and that a representative from the group is attending a meeting with the Council and bus company about a similar lack of bus service in Willowbrae.

Ellie referred to the Dumbiedykes community day where the University of Edinburgh had a stall and carried out engagement in that area for the first time. She advised that they had linked in with Canongate Youth and the Play Rangers and that it had been a great day.

Jackie reported that there are a good range of partners feeding into a mini plan created by the Dumbiedykes group and that various subgroups are taking actions forward.

Peter added that the 'On yer Doorstep' newsletter continues to grow and attract attention.

There was agreement that there is a good energy and resource around the Dumbiedykes working group.

Joint work with Fire service team- progression from joint streetwork that allowed team to maintain relationships when there were no open centres -for Fire services- it gave them a presence on the SE streets out with normal roles- this developed into a building based option-attracting 25+ young people per week to the Wednesday twilight session at VP -this includes fire skills, outdoor safety and first aid as well as providing a social space and we are working with young people known to police to be at risk of involvement in anti social behaviour or at risk — this group will form basis of a more intense -**Cooldown Crewe** type training course for 12 -that will run in spring 2022 from the local fire station

Actions completed in the last quarter (since the last progress report)

Panmure St Anns

Edinburgh Access Practice and Access Point consolidated into one location to provide services and support to the homeless accommodation in Edinburgh. The Edinburgh Health and Social Care Partnership will run the service in partnership with NHS Lothian and opened on 1st November 2021.

Hunter Square Working Group

Due to a continuation of issues including anti-social behaviour, disorder, violence and street drinking, the Hunter Square Working Group was established at the end of 2021. The multi-agency approach included representatives from Police Scotland, City of Edinburgh Council, the Simon Community, NHS Lothian, The Access Point and Edinburgh University. The aims of the group are to improve the area and reduce criminality. It was identified persons using the square who may have been involved in anti-social behaviour were often vulnerable and their needs and requirements addressed. The group has two sub-groups: People and Places, to allow the various members to concentrate on their area of expertise. The two work strands will look at supporting vulnerable persons, sign post to services on one hand, and also look at ways to improve the area, target criminality and look at better uses for the square. The partners from both private, public and third sector will work together bringing their experiences and skills to target this issue.

Hunter Square Problem Profile

Police Scotland analysists have produced a Problem Profile for Hunter Square. This has provided valuable data including crime types, times of year and possible options. This is currently being reviewed and will assist in the Hunter Square Working Group going forward.

Hunter Square Environmental Visual Audit

Police Scotland's Prevention Intervention and Partnership department conducted an Environmental Visual Audit of Hunter Square at the end of 2021 where it will work alongside the Problem Profile. A number of recommendations have been provided to assist in reducing ASB in this area.



Community Alcohol Partnership

Towards the end of 2021, the South East Community Alcohol Partnership (CAP) was established. The CAP cover 3 areas which include – Edinburgh City Centre, Meadows/Southside corridor, Moredun Multis, Gracemount Mansions and Burdiehouse Dip. The main focus of this scheme is underage drinking and the associated ASB however the tools available through this scheme will also be used to target street drinking in the Hunter Square area.

Inter-Agency Services Network

The ISN continues with representation from Simon Community, Police Scotland, NHS, City of Edinburgh Council, Salvation Army, Bethany Christian Trust, Cyrenians, Crisis and Social Bite. The group work together to target vulnerability in the homeless community. The group have engaged with people leaving prison weekly to look at what support can be provided. A number of persons with the most complex cases have been discussed with a holistic approach taken to help them. The group hold a budget which can be used for such things as travel money to return home, access to laptops and mobile phones, work clothing and CSCS cards.

Milestones expected to be achieved in the next quarter

Hunter Square Working Group

Continuation of the working group prior to Easter 2022 with diversionary and support options to be in place.

Multi Agency Vulnerable Adult Group

The MAVAG will continue in 2022 to look at support persons who have substance additions. The first group met in October 2021.

Prevention of Homelessness Duties. The Prevention Review Group are assessing which legal duties are required in order to prevent homelessness in Scotland. This is currently going through consultation with all public bodies. This will put in place a legal obligation on public bodies, including police, to act on persons who are or are about to become homeless.

Street Support

The Street Support App continues to be used by the public to assist in finding the right support for the homeless community. As part of Operation Winter City, extra police officers were deployed in Edinburgh City Centre to conduct extra patrols over the Christmas period. Historically the number of beggars increases in the city centre over this period due to the increased footfall. Officers on this detail engaged with persons begging and sign posted them to support services such as Street Works and the Street Support app. This helped in generating relationships with the homeless community and provide them with information on what help is available.
