<u>ITEM</u>		Peter asked that those present introduce themselves to the wider group. Peter then provided a general update in terms of activity that has taken place since the inaugural meeting of the Network in May. This has included nominating and electing a Neighbourhood Network Representative – Fred Marinello and then the inaugural meeting of the NW Locality Community Planning Partnership (LCPP) which has now met twice. Peter acknowledged that the processes to support the new community planning arrangements were still at an early stage and hoped that those attending, and the wider membership would continue to support the development of the network. Peter explained that Fred Marinello had provided his apologies as he was unwell. Fred was due to provide an update from LCPP meetings and with the network's permission, Scott was happy to do this in Fred's absence. 1. Introductions:			
2.	Neighbourhood Network Representative Update:	Scott explained that the LCPP had now met twice, with some focus on the format of the group and its structure. Like the networks, the LCPP is also 'finding it's feet' and there is a need to build relationships across the members. Cllr George Gordon and Steve Kerr – Western NN Representative (Corstorphine Community Council) have agreed to co-Chair the LCPP. The most recent meeting focused on reviewing the NW Locality Improvement Plan (LIP) and a copy of the LIP report discussed had been circulated to the Forth NN. The Edinburgh Partnership has asked that the LIP's are reviewed to improve how they align better with poverty and inequality-based issues and to link with the Edinburgh Local Outcomes Improvement Plan (LOIP) priorities. Other things likely to have some bearing on the future development of the LIP is the outcomes from the work of the poverty commission and to ensure the LIP doesn't address outcomes that are more associated with single service or 'business as usual' activity.	ubscrice.

		A discussion took place on transparency of the LCPP meetings, and it was explained that notes of these meetings would be able to be read and downloaded on the Edinburgh Partnership website. Scott added that the notes (once approved by LCPP) could be circulated to NN members. Helen S suggested that PCHP, and larger organisations like them, could provide a conduit for service users to influence NNs and LCPPs. She added that a 'North Edinburgh Action Group' (NEAG) forum had brought together some key local groups, and that they had developed a strategy which aimed to focus on three key strands: • Food • Access to spaces • Information It was agreed that Partners should be invited to NN meetings to be part of the local discussions and help identify solutions where possible.

4.	Forth Neighbourhood Network	Peter explained that in Forth, due to the higher density of Council Housing, there is a substantial HRA (Housing Revenue Account) fund to support environmental based initiatives. The fund comes via Council Housing Rents and must be spent on housing land.

Peter also informed those present of the Roads budget to support capital spend, much of which can be identified across communities where things like footpaths and fencing have been upgraded.

Similar to the Community Grant funding, the Council is keen to see the Neighbourhood Networks having a say on how these funds should be used and again, this can form part of the discussion at the next agenda item.

It was suggested that local patch Officers might be given a small budget to enable them to react more quickly to local issues. George and Peter explained that this is something that could be considered.

A discussion on the way forward for assessing and agreed NEP projects would take place under agenda item 5.

5. Developing the Forth Neighbourhood Network

Peter reminded those present that there is no intention from the Council or partners to lead in the shaping of the networks and this is entirely within the gift of its members.

Several issues or opportunities were discussed, and points raised: -

How do smaller groups get a voice in this new structure eg Older People's lunch groups? — The discussion led to identifying new ways to involve people, developing different themes. Suggested that a wider NN might not appeal to everyone but thematic approaches or engaging with different groups on different subjects might be more appealing.

Daytime meetings best to encourage some groups? – It was felt that for some groups and individuals, arranging activities during the daytime might help encourage better attendance.

Officers should withdraw to allow community discussion where needed? – Suggested that at times, the Network can meet with no officer involvement to help community groups and members have open discussion.

Themed meetings could help, but maybe in addition to regular meetings to ensure continuity of core discussions eg LIP? — There were some positive suggestions to develop an approach that could see an ongoing programme of themed events and activities that could also then help shape the North Small area LIP. This would assist the LIP review where the action plan for North would be more fluid and reactive to local issues.
